

But instead of being defeated by fear, uncertainties, and confusion, Caraga State University's urgent and proactive responses were ushered by commitment, synergy, resiliency, and service excellence.

Our concerted response to this global health crisis has led to remarkable breakthroughs. These were enabled by efficient utilization of public funds guided by the driving impetus of transparency, accountability, and fiscal probity.

This Agency Performance Review (APR) Report embodies the accomplishments of CSU, both physical and financial as of December 31, 2021. More specifically, this report presents the performance of CSU in the different indicators for physical target set under the General Appropriations Act F.Y. 2021. The enormous feat of *achieving all the physical targets for F.Y.* 2021 is further discussed in this APR Report underscoring the several facilitating factors.

Further, the report reflects the rigid and concerted efforts of the University to continuously monitor the utilization efficiency and effectiveness of public funds committed to the University's keeping in compliance with the cash budgeting system policy of the national government. The financial performance was carefully discussed to capture the clearer picture of the fiscal position of CSU with justifications.

Yielding to the mantra of the University to continuously improve and reinvent itself to keep afloat in the demands of the changing time, the report not only includes the summary of findings and in-depth analysis of the facilitating factors and the bottlenecks of achieving the physical and financial targets but also features catch-up plans and recommendations to further improve the performance of CSU in F.Y. 2022. Key learnings in the implementation of programs, projects, and activities amidst such challenging times to serve as springboards as we embark onto another fiscal year.

Overall, the University's performance reflects the current institutional adjustments and initiatives as we navigate the higher education landscape of the New Normal. Leveraging on the commitment of our growing community and synergized by meaningful partnerships with development partners and oversight agencies, we will continue to fulfill our commitment to the public we are privileged to serve as one and united CSU.





#### **General Justification**

This is to provide justification on the physical and financial accomplishments pertaining to the infrastructure projects funded under GAA F.Y. 2021, *viz*:

#### a. Weather Inclement

As supported by rainfall data obtained from the DOST-PAGASA, the University has approved request for time extension from contractors due to weather inclement. It cannot be gainsaid that inclement in weather is an uncontrollable factor that severely impacts the construction projects. Inclement weather conditions may trigger a myriad of possible hazards and as such, it would be indispensable to consider the request of time extension due to weather inclement to protect construction workers to any untoward incidents especially so that safety is paramount in the implementation of the construction projects in the University.

The University also hereby reassures that prudence and diligence is strictly observed prior to the approval of the extension of time on the basis of weather inclement taking into consideration that the extension shall not exceed the number of days with heavy rainfall intensity as can be gleaned on the DOST-PAGASA Report.

#### b. Reprioritization of the Program of Works

Based on the National Expenditure Program (NEP) for F.Y. 2022, CSU has a total proposed appropriation of Php 326, 636, 000.00 which amounts to a sharp decrease of Php 520,434,000.00. To underscore, there are *no appropriations* for infrastructure projects including those that are *supposed to be completed in F.Y. 2022*, *viz*:

- (1) Construction of University Gymnasium
- (2) Establishment of Ladies' and Gents' Dormitory
- (3) Provision of State-of-the Art Furnitures, Fixtures and Equipment to the Newly Constructed CEIT Complex





Upon the release of NEP 2022, the University proactively instituted measures to ensure optimal functionality of infrastructure projects which are supposedly to be completed by F.Y. 2022 but were not included in the NEP. The University was ardent in its lobbying efforts to Congress for the reconsideration of major infrastructure projects but is also cognizant on the impending discontinuance of fund support in the GAA highly attributed by limited fiscal space brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic and the implementation of Mandanas Ruling.

Perforce, the University must reprioritize the program of works (POW) to ensure optimal functioning of big-ticket infrastructure projects which affects the fund utilization of the projects due to deviation in the implementation timeline vis-à-vis the projected ones and as a consequence thereof, variation orders were implemented.

#### c. Variation Order

It is well-settled that variation orders may be issued by the Procuring Entity to cover any increase/decrease in quantities, including the introduction of new work items that are not included in the original contract or reclassification of work items that are either due to change of plans, design or alignment to suit actual field conditions resulting in disparity between the preconstruction plans used for purposes of bidding and the "as staked plans" or construction drawings prepared after a joint survey by the Contractor and the Procuring Entity after award of the contract, provided that the cumulative amount of the Variation Order does not exceed ten percent (10%) of the original project cost.

Taking into consideration the complexities of the vertical structures that CSU is implementing, the benefit of variation order is geared towards improving the quality standard such projects. This is also part of the commitment of the University to eliminate unnecessary costs from a project to optimize the benefits against the resource input by reducing the unnecessary costs. This measure has also facilitated in realizing the balance between cost, function and quality required of a project which collectively redound to the benefit of providing state-of-the-art learning and working space to our served clients.

The University wishes to underscore that the variation orders were perused and deliberated in a timely manner. The reasons for each variation were likewise properly identified and documented. CSU humbly maintains that construction projects encompass complex operations which cannot be accurately determined in advance despite the rigid and stringent pre-planning and planning





activities. As such variation orders were pivotal to satisfy the needs of the University for the overall project, rectify the problems faced during the implementation phase and to be able to complete the project with optimal efficiency of the public funds committed to CSU's keeping.

#### d. FLR Project Implementation


CSU also implemented an infrastructure project, *Construction/Improvement of College of Tourism, and Hospitality Management* amounting to Php 15, 000, 000.00. tagged as FLR which was only released only upon the authority of the Office of the Philippine President. The SARO was released in August 2021.



Since there were no PE classes conducted within the University, no students were obliged to buy PE uniforms. For Caraga Center for Geoinformatics, they were not able to conduct trainings due to travel restrictions thus no payment for professional services and honorarium. The same is the situation with Fabrication Laboratory business center wherein only few clients came in to avail their services due to travel restrictions and no outsiders were allowed to come inside the premises of the University.



TOP 4 - SUC with the Highest Number of Level II Accredited Programs in 2020








