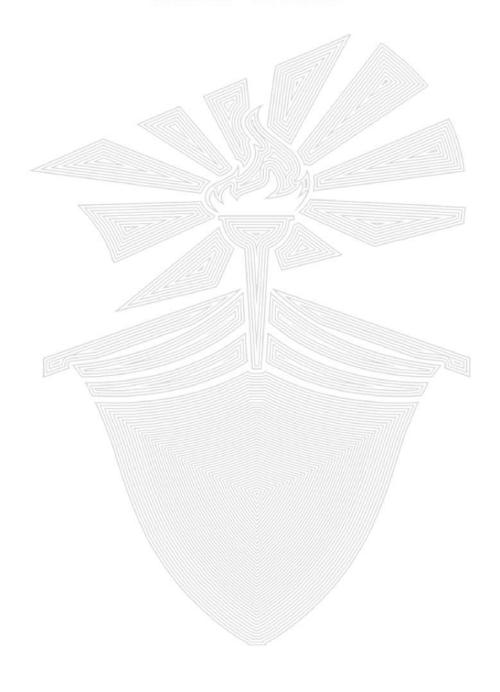

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The University realizing most of its 2023 fiscal targets despite the fact that the collected amount for Free Higher Education Act is 33.75% lower than what is actually billed based on actual enrollment, is attributable to the adoption of a rationalized procedure for procurement and disbursement pursuant to the University Quality Management System which is compliant to ISO 9001:2015 standard. Another contributory factor for such accomplishment is the presence of a functional Internal Fiscal Committee which periodically apprised the fiscal performance of the different units. The Internal Fiscal Committee along with the different cost centers took the lead in analyzing different concerns which hampered the realization of the University fiscal targets. In this process, the different cost centers were empowered, thus enabling them to manage their fiscal resources to realize their targets. resources to realize their targets.

However, for areas where the University has failed to meet its fiscal targets, the same are attributable to the following:

- The contracts for the Janitorial and the Security Services will end on February 15, 2024 and February 29, 2024, respectively. As such, security services will still be rendered up to the said period. Thus, disbursement will only be done after the said period.
- The billings for utilities, and internet & mobile subscriptions for the month of Dec 2023 were paid in January 2024.
- The salary differential for the teaching personnel hired on December 19, 2023, will be processed for disbursement in 2024.
- The procured supplies and materials were not yet delivered; thus, payment will be made after the delivery is done.
- The withholding and local taxes which were only remitted in January 2024. Included are also the warranty retentions which will only be released after three (3) months for supplies and materials and one (1) year for equipment and infrastructure projects or upon submission of surety bond.
- The conduct of dissertations and theses oral defense of graduate and undergraduate students were conducted towards the end of the semester; thus disbursements of the corresponding honoraria will be done in January 2024.
- The expenses incurred for activities held towards the end of the year including honoraria of speakers for trainings will be paid once required documents are submitted accordingly.

As regards the University's revenue performance, the 76.34% accomplishment for the Internally Generated Fund was brought about by the fact that the University only collected 66.25% of its actual billing for the FHE from the DBM, an amount that is provided for in the 2023 GAA ceiling for FHE. On the other hand, the 80% for the revolving fund was attributable to the fact that the necessary supplies and materials were not yet delivered. As such, no product delivery was done, thus no collection was generated.

PHYSICAL PERFORMANCE

Higher Education Program

Furthermore, the university has consistently achieved a high percentage of first-time licensure exam passers, reflecting the effectiveness of its teaching methodologies and the preparedness of its graduates for preferational practice. of its graduates for professional practice. Lastly, the significant percentage of employed graduates from two years prior underscores the university's success in equipping students with the skills, knowledge, and competencies sought after by employers, thus facilitating a smooth transition from academia to the workforce and contributing to regional development goals.

Advanced Education Program

CSU likewise demonstrated outstanding performance across key indicators, underscoring its commitment to fostering advanced learning and research excellence. Firstly, the university has achieved a significant percentage of graduate students enrolled in research degree programs, reflecting its dedication to cultivating a culture of inquiry and innovation among its student body. By providing opportunities for advanced research, the university not only equips graduate students with specialized knowledge and skills but also contributes to the generation of new knowledge and the advancement of various fields.

Secondly, CSU succeeded in accrediting its graduate programs, with a high percentage meeting accreditation standards. This accreditation affirms the quality and rigor of the university's advanced education offerings, ensuring that graduates are well-prepared to excel in their chosen fields and contribute meaningfully to societal advancement. Additionally, the university has demonstrated robust faculty engagement in research activities, as evidenced by the percentage of graduate school faculty involved in various research endeavors. From pursuing advanced research degrees to conducting investigative, basic and applied scientific, policy, and social science research, as well as a resolution of the production of the p producing technologies for commercialization or livelihood, faculty members at CSU are actively contributing to knowledge creation, dissemination, and application, thus enriching both academic scholarship and societal impact.

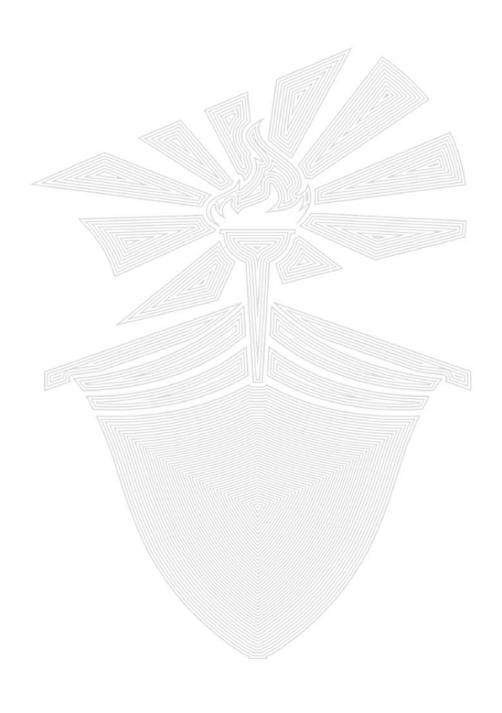

Additionally, we are grateful for the partnerships we have established with various stakeholders, which have been instrumental in facilitating collaboration, knowledge exchange, and resource-sharing. 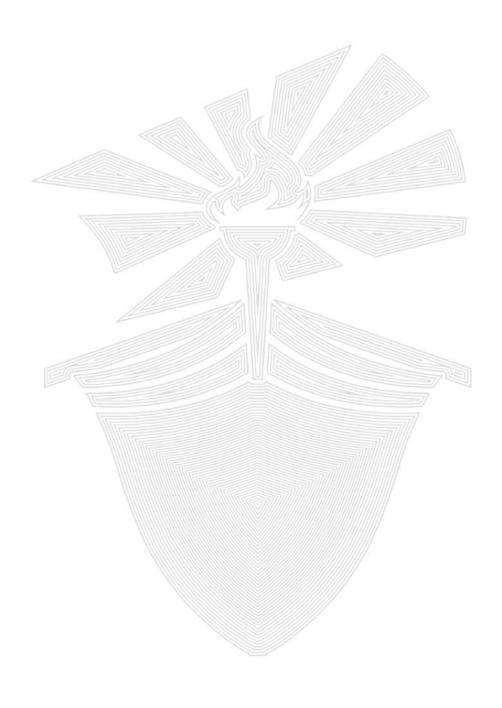


OVERALL AGENCY RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. In summary for the University to improve its fiscal performance, it is imperative that the procurement of needed items be carefully programmed to ensure that all the prescribed rules and regulations pertinent to such process are strictly followed within the prescribed time frame. This must be complemented by subjecting all personnel in the prescribed time frame. involved in fiscal and procurement processes to relevant training. In addition, the monitoring of the fiscal operations of the University by the Office of the Financial Management Services in coordination with the Internal Fiscal Committee must be continued and strengthened.
- 2. Building on the success of the Technical Advisory and Extension Program, Caraga State University should continue fostering active partnerships with local government units, industries, CSOs, and other stakeholders. These collaborations can facilitate knowledge exchange, research collaboration, and resource-sharing, thereby enriching the university's academic programs and extending its influence in addressing societal challenges.
- 3. Given the university's performance in research output and publication, efforts should be made to enhance the dissemination of research findings to broader audiences. This may include organizing seminars, workshops, and conferences to share research outcomes with industry practitioners, policymakers, and the general public, thereby maximizing the societal impact of Caraga State University's research endeavors.
- 4. CSU should continue striving to accredit additional programs across disciplines. Focus will also be placed in the upcoming SUC levelling, Philippine Quality Awards reapplication, ASEAN University memberships and program accreditation, and Quacquarelli Symonds (QS) Asian Ranking.
- 5. Given the university's success in producing high percentages of licensure exam passers and employed graduates, efforts should be made to further enhance student support services. This may include expanding career counseling, internship opportunities, and alumni engagement initiatives to ensure that graduates are wellprepared for the transition to the workforce and equipped with the skills needed for lifelong success.

The submitted documents of each category were explicitly reviewed and checked to sew up the completeness, correctness, and accuracy of the reports since the same shall undergo a rigid screening and review by the Inter-Agency Task Force (IATF) which will be the basis of the evaluation on the grant of the PBB. Findings and discussions that emanate during the discussion shall also be the bases for continuous quality improvement in the operations of the different of pillars of the University.

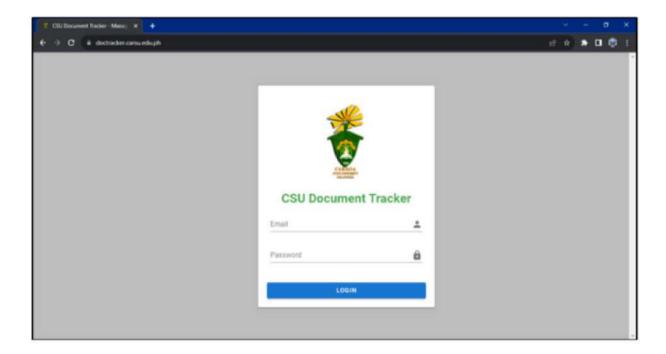

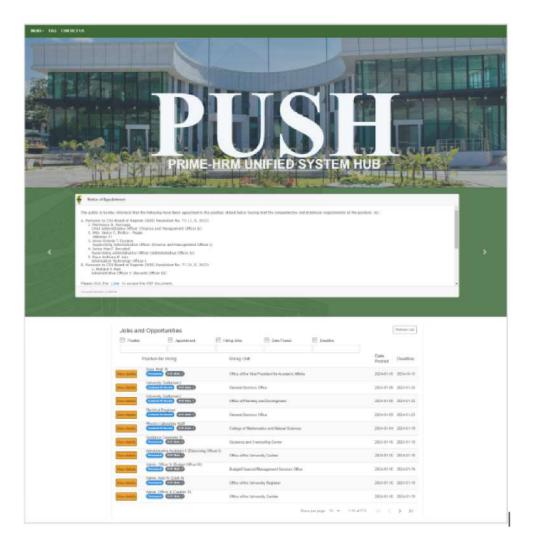

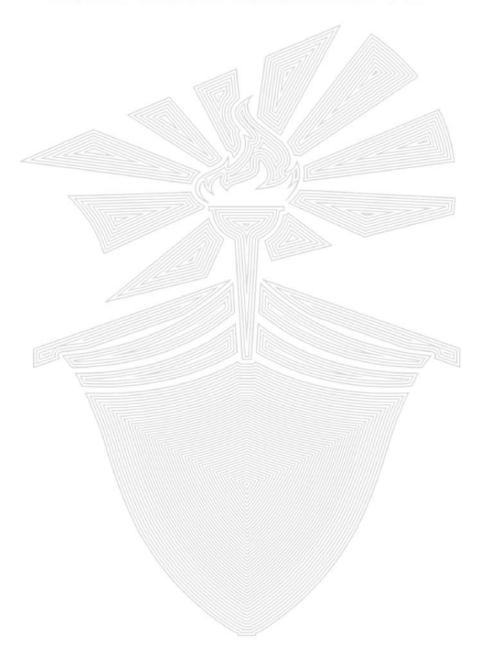
